### LATE ITEMS/DELETIONS/CONSENT ITEMS

Chair Groen asked the Board about adding three late agenda items as: 6E Resolution Recommending Potter Park Zoological Society Reimbursement for Administrative Support; 6F Resolution Authorizing a Fund Transfer to the Potter Park Zoological Society for 2015 Marketing; and 6G Resolution Authorizing a Transfer of Funds and Authorization for the Potter Park Zoological Society to Provide the Management of Seasonal Workers it was moved, supported and all were in agreement.

### Presentation of Phase 1 Schematic Design for the Healthcare Facility

Mr. West stated he is from C2AE which is a local Lansing based architectural engineering surveying planning consultant who was teamed with Design Level from Columbus. Possesses a wealth of human and animal healthcare experience which made them the perfect partner. They've worked with County zoo staff and MSU Veterinarian staff to the needs and wants and develop a vision. This is the first phase and is headed for fundraising.

Mr. Barga said this is their 11<sup>th</sup> animal hospital. He talked about the floor plan, site plan, and explained the renderings.. There are treatment rooms and the surgery rooms feed off of the treatment rooms. Then on the other side of treatment rooms, are the radiology and pharmacy rooms. There is a garage with a cage and a hoist as an animal typically would be delivered by a pickup, van or horse trailer, then they have a straight shot into the treatment room. This is comparable to a human hospital in aesthetics and sterility. There is also a public viewing area where the visitors can go to observe an animal being treated.

Mr. West said there is a flood plan and from a financial aspect they wanted to stay out of the flood plan area. There is the North American area and they didn't want to land lock that area of the zoo. He said that the back of the building is very totalitarian and needed enough room to be able to turn vehicles around, but not wanting to build a lot of pavement.

Ms. Kameoka said what is unique about Potter Park Zoo is it is located within a park and when they looked at the existing contents; they purposely didn't make the roof red as they wanted it to blend in with the park. The exterior will basically be maintenance free. The flooring they are looking at is a stained concrete floor which has lots of fun things you can do with it.

Discussion ensued. Mrs. Graham said they wanted to make sure everyone is involved from every aspect of the zoo like special events, education, and animal staff and made room for a big zoo lesson class. She wanted three things out of this; rental space to produce revenue, additional holding, and bragging rights.

### NEW BUSINESS

#### Resolution Recommending the Acceptance of a \$250.00 Risk Avoidance Program (Rap) Grant Award for a Grill Guard for the Patrol Car at Potter Park Zoo from the Michigan Municipal Risk Management Association (Mmrma) Resolution #14-13

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo participated in a grant opportunity with MMRMA; and

**WHEREAS**, MMRMA provides financial assistance for the purchase of materials relating to providing a safer and more efficient facility; and

WHEREAS, the grant funds will reimburse Potter Park Zoo for 50% of the cost of a grill guard for a patrol vehicle at Potter Park Zoo; and

WHEREAS, installation of the grill guard will aid in the prevention of damage to the vehicle while adding additional lighting.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Potter Park Zoo Board recommends to the Board of Commissioners acceptance of the grant funds from MMRMA in the amount of \$250.00 and extends its appreciation for the opportunity to participate in the Risk Avoidance Program (RAP).

Moved by Commissioner Tsernoglou and Supported by Mr. Feuka that resolution #14-13 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

### Resolution Recommending the Acceptance of a \$300.00 Risk Avoidance Program (RAP) Grant Award for Body Worn Cameras for Public Safety Personnel at Potter Park Zoo from the Michigan Municipal Risk Management Association (MMRMA) Resolution #14-12

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo participated in a grant opportunity with MMRMA; and

**WHEREAS**, MMRMA provides financial assistance for the purchase of materials relating to providing a safer and more efficient facility; and

WHEREAS, the grant funds will reimburse Potter Park Zoo for 50% of the cost for Body Worn Cameras at Potter Park Zoo; and

WHEREAS, use of these cameras will aid in proper documentation, accountability, and safety.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Potter Park Zoo Board recommends to the Board of Commissioners acceptance of the grant funds from MMRMA in the amount of \$300.00 and extends its appreciation for the opportunity to participate in the Risk Avoidance Program (RAP).

Moved by Commissioner Tsernoglou and Supported by Mr. Feuka that resolution #14-112 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

### Approval of the Potter Park Zoo Contract with Ingham County

Mr. Feuka said this is a requirement that came back in 2012 and it was something which had slipped through the cracks by the County, Society, and the County Attorney. They started the process to re-execute the contract and it was really the context of Mrs. Graham being in the joint position of Zoo Director/Society Executive Director and this has not received a final vote by the Society Board, but was approved by the Ad hoc Committee. The original contract was signed in 2008. Unfortunately it had lapsed and the new contract will have additional amendments built into it.

Chair Groen said since this is the first time we are looking at the contract, is there any desire to look at this contract at the next meeting.

Mr. Feuka thought it a good idea and stated how it needs to go through all of the Boards.

Discussion ensued. It was agreed upon to bring it back it back to next month's Board meeting in resolution format.

### **Discussion on Including Parking with Zoo Memberships**

Mrs. Graham said there has never been zoo parking included in zoo memberships, but she would like to include that for additional revenue. She didn't want to do it until talking to them first and it would be another level of membership, but have not discussed prices yet.

Discussion ensued. They talked about the County Parks parking passes and will bring a resolution to the Board either next month or the following month.

### Resolution Recommending Potter Park Zoological Society Reimbursement for Administrative Support Resolution #14-11

**WHEREAS**, it is the desire of the Potter Park Zoo Board and the zoo management team to continue to move toward an equitable and successful and seamless public/private partnership with Potter Park Zoological Society; and

WHEREAS, these two entities incur joint administrative and financial services expenses in the comprehensive management of the zoo; and

WHEREAS, the combined budget of the two entities is \$5.2 million; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoological Society individual budget is \$1.8 million or 33.9% of the total; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo millage budget is \$3.5 million or 66.1% of the total; and

**WHEREAS**, the Potter Park Zoological Society has assumed the responsibility of the majority of the administrative and financial services expense totaling \$231,375.00 for FY 2014; and

**WHEREAS**, applying the above percentages to the administrative and financial services budget expenses for 2014 yields an allocation of \$78,475 (33.9%) to Potter Park Zoological Society and \$152,900 (66.1%) to Potter Park Zoo; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoological Society currently receives compensation from the County in the amount of \$50,881; and

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Zoo Board authorizes the transfer \$102,020 from Potter Park Zoo to Potter Park Zoological Society to provide equity between the two entities; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the transfer of funds for the year 2014 in the amount of \$102,020 be made from fund balance line item #258-69200-818000-698010 from the Potter Park Zoo Millage to the Potter Park Zoological Society as a one-time transfer.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Controller/Administrator of the Chair of the Board of Commissioners be authorized to make the necessary transfer of funds.

Moved by Commissioner Tsernoglou and Supported by Chair Groen that resolution #14-11 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

Mrs. Graham said this covers the joint administrative for both financial and for herself as well and is the same as last year.

### Resolution Authorizing a Fund Transfer to the Potter Park Zoological Society for 2015 Marketing Resolution #14-14

**WHEREAS**, the electorate of Ingham County overwhelmingly approved the millage renewal proposal in November of 2010 to fund the operation and improvement of Potter Park and the Potter Park Zoo; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoological Society is a private, 501c(3) nonprofit, fundraising organization that raises funds to support the Zoo; and

**WHEREAS**, in that capacity the Zoological Society supports: Marketing, Educational Programming, the Docent Association, the Teen Zookeeper Program, Special Events and the Zookambi Summer Camp; and

**WHEREAS**, the Zoological Society operates on a \$1,800,000 budget, all of which is spent on supporting the Potter Park Zoo through educational programming, special events, operating costs, and capital improvements; and

**WHEREAS**, the Ingham County Board of Commissioners approved the transfer of \$60,000 from the proceeds of the Potter Park Zoo Millage to the Potter Park Zoological Society for 2014 marketing purposes; and

**WHEREAS**, the Potter Park Zoological Society has proposed at least \$15,000 for advertising within the 2015 Society budget for a total of \$75,000 to be spent on advertising and marketing.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, the Board of Commissioners approves a transfer of \$60,000 from the proceeds of the Potter Park Zoo Millage to be used by the Potter Park Zoological Society for the 2015 marketing of the Potter Park Zoo.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Controller/Administrator be authorized to make the necessary transfer of funds.

Moved by Commissioner Tsernoglou and Supported by Mrs. Leys that resolution #14-14 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

Mrs. Graham said this is the same as last year, but if you look at the last whereas it has the Potter Park Zoological Society has proposed at least \$15,000 because the society has not completed their budget for next year yet.

### Resolution Authorizing a Transfer of Funds and Authorization for the Potter Park Zoological Society to Provide the Management of Seasonal Workers

### Resolution #14-15

**WHEREAS**, it is the continuing desire of the Potter Park Zoo Board and the Zoo Management Team to work towards a successful Private/Public relationship with the Potter Park Zoological Society; and

**WHEREAS**, the Zoo Management Team wishes to continue to provide excellent customer service and be able to improve upon existing standards and proceed in a financially prudent manner; and

**WHEREAS**, the Zoo Management Team recommends that combining resources in the key customer service areas, by having all seasonal staff be hired, trained, supervised and paid by the Potter Park Zoological Society, will allow the Zoo to provide the most effective and consistent customer service; and

**WHEREAS**, the Zoo Management Team has identified funding within the 2015 approved Potter Park Zoo budget, which will provide for adequate staff as determined by the Zoo Director, as well as additional funds that can be transferred to other line items within the budget; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Commissioners Resolution #14-02 was approved for the transfer of funds to the Potter Park Zoo Society for the year of 2014.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Ingham County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Potter Park Zoological Society to provide the management of the seasonal employees at the Potter Park Zoo.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Ingham County Board of Commissioners approves the transfer of funds for the year 2014 in the amount of \$141,000 from the Potter Park Zoo Millage to the Potter Park Zoo Society from the following line items:

- \$47,874 from admissions seasonal wages, line item #258-69200-705000-32000
- \$31,700 from seedeater seasonal, line item #258-69200-705000-31300
- \$24,000 from animal/care seasonal, line item #258-69200-705000-31000
- \$14,000 from parking seasonal, line item #258-69300-705000-35000
- \$23,426 from grounds & maintenance seasonal, line #258-69200-705000-30000

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Controller/Administrator and the Chair of the Board of Commissioners be authorized to make the necessary transfer of funds.

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Moved by Commissioner Tsernoglou and Supported by Ms. Flood that resolution #14-15 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

Mrs. Graham said this is for the seasonal workers and is the same as last year.

Mr. Wingeier said this is for \$10,000 more due to the minimum wage increase and we are using more hours with admission people and there was a deficit last year and want to recoup for that too.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

### Moose Exhibit Update

Mrs. Graham said as far as the exhibit goes, we have one more week until the Indiana Bats are to leave. Now, we have issues with the City Planning that needs to wade through that as well. The bids are in, so if we have a decent winter and early spring, then we can be ready for the next season.

### Hospital Financials

Mrs. Graham stated that we've had a presentation from C2AE and Design Level earlier this evening, so there's nothing new to report.

### **Strategic Planning Update**

Mrs. Graham said there was a meeting with the management team. There were three lists; complaints, easy fixes, and true visioning.

### Resolution Authorizing a Change of Fees for the charitable Events at Potter Park Zoo RESOLUTION #14-10

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo wishes to establish a change of fees for charitable events which would cover the operational expenses of the zoo during these events; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo has become an independent department within Ingham County and in the past has always mirrored the Parks Department fees; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo charges for the use of the Pavilion rental only and entry fees to the zoo were waived; and

WHEREAS, the pavilion rental fees that are currently being charged will remain unchanged; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Potter Park Zoo Board authorizes the Potter Park Zoo charitable events fees to be charged a rate of \$4.00 per person.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the charitable event fees will become effective upon approval of the Board of Commissioners.

## Moved by Chair Groen and Supported by Commissioner Tsernoglou that resolution #14-10 be approved. (Yes-8; No-0). MOTION CARRIED.

Mrs. Graham said this went to County Services and Finance when they were at the AZA Conference, so no one was there to speak to the committee about the resolution. It was approved at County Services and was not approved at Finance. Mr. Bennett, Parks Director, was asked to speak for the zoo to the Finance County about it and gave misinformation. She had Mr. Wingeier and Ms. Rostar go to the County Commissioners Meeting and it had been pulled from the agenda.

Commissioner Tsernoglou said it went to County Services again and it was tabled, since it didn't pass finance, they needed someone to speak to them from the department. They just wanted to hear someone.

Mrs. Graham said she was told by the county controller to start back at the Zoo Board level again. It's more affirmative when it begins here.

Discussion ensued. They decided to vote again on it.

### ZOO DIRECTORS REPORT

Mrs. Graham said they are going thru a reorganization of the keepers. One of the lead keepers is retiring on November 12<sup>th</sup> this year and the other one next spring. Right now, there are two 600 positions and 12 400 positions; and when the reorganizations is finished there will be one 600; 3 500's and the rest will be 400's. This is to better facilitate responsibility, but has to go through a 11 step

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restructuring program. We hope to have it completed and put into place by the first of next year. The keeper's jobs are changing more and more every year because of new accreditation compliances. The Raven Exhibit will not be done by Boo at the Zoo.

### FINANCIAL REPORTS

Mr. Wingeier spoke about the following items: letter A – animal care is an expensive area due to several large purchases of medication and food; letter B – salaries & wages full time as security has increased coverage compared to last year; letter C – salaries & wages seasonal was posted to purchased services; letter D – benefits have increased due to health care insurance and workers compensation insurance; letter E – purchased services contains seasonal labor resolution of \$135,000; letter F – utilities have created large fluctuations; letter G – IT Support expense as this is a major expense to maintain the county network and is spread to all departments. The attendance looks rough, but there were no special events during the month.

### **BOARD COMMENTS**

Chair Groen thanked Mr. Feuka for his service to the Board as he is resigning.

Mr. Feuka thanked Chair Groen and the Board and said his greatest achievement was bringing Mrs. Graham on board. He said he is transferring to upstate New York in about three weeks. He's really impressed with the group here and their proactive supportive engagement which really helps make Mrs. Graham's job much easier. He also thanked them for his time and he will miss the zoo.

Mrs. Leys said she's trying to be more disaster prepared at home by having more food, etc. and wondered if the zoo has a plan. She knows they've talked about evacuating animals, but is there a plan for the zoo and if there's not it might be a good idea.

Mrs. Graham stated there are guidelines in which they are in compliance with AZA, but may not be congruent to personal preparedness. One issue is space and another is getting employees in and out. She will have to research and check into it and get back with you. We do have generators here and the zoo did not lose power last year during the ice storm.

## Below you will find the quarterly reports from the Potter Park Zoo's department heads summarizing the events and activities of 2014's second quarter.

Veterinary Report - Dr. Sally Nofs, Interim Director of Animal Health

ZIMS has recently replaced Medarks as the new zoo medical recordkeeping program. There is a lot to learn and adaptations to be made. At some point, we will once again be able to share numbers regarding procedures with you once again.

I began as interim Director of Animal Health July 30, 2014. Discussions and meetings are being held to determine what the zoo desires in the Veterinary department during this time of change.

Deb Paperd attended the Association of Zoo Veterinary Technicians conference in September. She attended a ZIMS medical record system training class in addition to many sessions on various topics.

I attended the annual American Association of Zoo Veterinarians conference in Orlando.

The veterinary resident Dr. Kim Thompson also attended AAZV conference and presented a penguin case at the Pathology workshop.

I took time off in September to honor a previous commitment to help teach a field research course in the Brazilian Pantanal for veterinarians and wildlife biologists/zoologists. Field research on giant anteaters was also a part of the trip, flying in a small plane with other wildlife veterinarians deeper into the Pantanal where they darted and collected samples on wild giant anteaters. I am a research associate and North American representative for the Brazilian organization Project Anteater (Projeto Tamandua).

We continue to work on preventative medicine including preshipment exams for outgoing animals and consulting with veterinarians at sending institutions about preshipment exams for incoming animals.

## Animal Report – Cindy Wagner, General Curator

Animal acquisitions in progress:

<u>Gray Wolves</u>-2.0 from New York State Zoo. This is the same zoo we received Tala from.

Arctic Fox-0.3 from Nebraska

<u>Eagle Owls</u>- 1.0 from Lion Safari in Ontario & 0.1 from Conservation Centre for Specialized Species. They will be a breeding pair when they reach sexual maturity. Permitting will take time so they will arrive sometime this winter after the permits are completed. These are both SSP recommendations.

<u>Red Panda</u>- 1.0 from Minnesota & 0.1 from Fort Wayne Children's Zoo. They will be a breeding pair when they reach sexual maturity. These are both SSP recommendations.

## Animal dispositions in progress:

<u>Bongo</u>- 0.1, last year's calf, going to Tampa's Lowry Park Zoo. This is a SSP recommendation.

<u>Tree Shrew</u>- 0.1, one of this year's pups, going to Denver Zoo. This is a SSP recommendation.

Red Panda-1.0 Walter, institution to be determined by SSP.

<u>Burmese Python</u>- in the permitting process, going to Fort Worth Zoo. We will be replacing him with a species more suitable in size for the exhibit space, species yet to be determined by Animal Management Committee.

## Exhibit Updates:

<u>Raven</u>- the exhibit is nearing completion. We will be introducing our male and female for the first time in the new exhibit. Currently our male is located in an exhibit near the Bird House and the female is off exhibit behind the Discovery Building. We are considering species for a mixed-species exhibit in the future.

<u>Red Panda</u>- Plans are in progress for a major overhaul to the old spider monkey exhibit for the red pandas. This will increase the size of the exhibit, move the exhibit farther from the large cats, allow for a separate maternity stall and create a space for visitors to view the pandas inside.

## AZA Conference:

The conference was very helpful and I was able to gather ideas to enhance our conservation efforts both In Situ and Ex Situ. I am looking forward to finding more conservation partners and increasing our focus on conservation as an institution.

## Staff:

Dennis Sweeney will be retiring on November 12<sup>th</sup>. There will be a retirement party for him from 3-6pm on the 12<sup>th</sup> in the Safari room. Dennis has been a dedicated keeper for 33 years and will be missed. We will be hiring temporary keepers to fill Dennis's position until the keeper reorganization is completed.

Potter Park Zoo's AAZK (American Association of Zookeepers) Chapter raised \$2600.00 for Bowling for Rhinos. This was the first year we have had an AAZK Chapter and the first year we have participated in Bowling for Rhinos. The keepers are very excited to continue raising money to support conservation efforts.

## Education Report - Dennis Laidler, Education Curator

## **Overall Education Programming:**

. Due to record adverse weather in the first quarter and some of that bad weather continuing into the second quarter, numbers are down just slightly year to date. However, we do have some good news –virtually all of our programs since then have been coming in at or above last year's pace. In other words, despite all of the aforementioned adverse weather, we have an excellent chance of eclipsing last year's figures. The really, really good news is that Zookambi set another record in attendance. We had 670 campers this summer! To put that in perspective last year's attendance was 423 (itself a record increase from 2012's 278). Adding a third instructor, adding 20 new class offerings, great marketing, and awesome instruction by our staff have combined to make this the best Zookambi season ever. If we have a really good final quarter, we are still optimistic about reaching our many ambitious goals for the year. **See Attached Summary Below:** 

**Docent Recruitment, Training & Continuing Education:** Docents will be soon undergoing their annual animal handling refresher course and some additional continuing education. To expedite these important processes, we will be developing some blended learning strategies – incorporating some online video and PowerPoint instruction in addition to the hands-on portions of the training. In two meetings in August, the docents and volunteers were very appreciative and embraced their opportunity to contribute input for the strategic plan initiative.

**BIG Zoo Lesson (BZL):** After discussing the pros and cons of booking BZL as heavily we did last year, and looking at next year's school calendar, classroom availability and staff workloads, we revised downward our goals for BZL to the range of 55-57 classes and that is right where we

are at currently. In addition to training the 10 new, first-time BZL teachers in our program, we will also be training12 new teachers for Binder Park Zoo's BZL program (a fee/participant arrangement) on October 28-29.

**Zoo Science High School Class:** Rebecca Morningstar, our instructor has made some changes in the curriculum to enhance the animal medicine components and has formed a new FFA chapter for the class, a state curriculum-driven requirement. We have 30 students participating this year.

**Teen Zookeeper Program:** Another 85 teens aged 13-18 had the opportunity to intimately experience the zoo this summer, thanks to the cooperation of the animal care staff. The teen zookeepers have five different areas in which they can volunteer: one-on-one with zoo keepers; pony rides; animal contact area; Zookambi summer camp; and, new this year, Wings Down Under exhibit. They began June 14<sup>th</sup>, and volunteered through Labor Day weekend.

**Lake Trust Credit Union:** LTCU has agreed to provide \$5,000.00 in financial support to nest summer's Zookambi program. This will provide 25 students from the Lansing School District an opportunity to participate in a full week of all-day Zookambi, with early drop-off and late pick-up options.

**Looking Ahead:** Later this school year we will be piloting a special week of the BIG Zoo Lesson for a class of special needs students from the Beekman Center. Sherrie is working with a potential sponsor to help defray some of the costs.

We are looking at more effective ways to provide nature playscapes for young children and their families here at the zoo. Based on all the latest research this is a very important need and it is a high priority for the AZA.


