LIMITED PUBLIC COMMENT

Mrs. Carol Webster talked about how she retired in 2005 as the Potter Park Zoo Society Executive Director and also worked at Columbus Zoo prior to here. She said they were very successful as the Zoological Society for a number of reasons. The Zoo Society is a strong assistant to the zoo and fundraising is the most important part next to public relations, but because of all the other things that go on here; education, special events, and the volunteers and docents. The zoo society was successful for a lot of reasons like; fundraising and guest services. She was very active in fundraising and had given Mayor Hollister three checks for \$400k for the Education, gift shop, and Welcome Center Buildings to be built. It's a mistake to think that the Zoo Society is not important. The zoo is only as strong as the people involved personally through the zoo society. She said the memberships are an important part here too. She gave a speech to the Sunrise Rotary Club and two days later a man from the Glassen Foundation came into the office and we matched a grant from the City for the Otter Exhibit. It is easy to raise money for the zoo.

NEW BUSINESS

Structure of Society & County and Hiring of the New Zoo Director

Mr. Dolehanty said that he will be addressing and presenting to the County Services and Finance Committees in September to terminate the agreement with the Zoological Society as of December 31, 2016. He talked about how the BOC is the governing board and they are the group that develops the policies and AZA has authorized the BOC to govern the zoo. He is the Controller/Administrator, as the chief fiscal and administrative officer for Ingham County, and so he is to supervise the Zoo Director. The Zoo Director is responsible for the zoo through zoo policies, goals, objectives and procedures to help maintain the AZA accreditation. The Zoo Board is appointed by the BOC and is responsible for reviews of the zoo operations and makes recommendations to them. The Zoo Board reviews the budget, CIP, and policies and procedures and offers input and recommendations. The PPZS is a non-profit organization to help support the zoo with programs for educational purposes and fundraising. He said they have done a national recruitment for the position of the Zoo Director and have received 18 applications and only nine met the qualifications. He said the appointment has been left up to him to make, but he will listen to what everyone has to say in regards to the hiring of a new director. He's hoping to have this person hired by October 31st. He talked about how he arrived at the compensation rates and how they are on target with the local/regional/national market per AZA and the BOC has approved also. He also talked about the how the millage approved by the County voters provides 80.8% of all operational revenue and the PPZS provided 19.2% revenue mostly through memberships, fundraising efforts and educational programs. He wants the new model to start on January 1st as it's the new budget year and it's the off season for the zoo and there will be time to fine tune this and see what work's best for everyone. He will be putting together a resolution for when the Board meets that will put this into motion in regards of terminating the contract with the Society which will end on December 31st and new will start on January 1st. The zoo needs to be involved in the day to day operations while the society needs to focus on education and advocacy and fundraising and move forward.

Discussion ensued. Mr. Dolehanty said he will be meeting with the Society every two weeks until the contract is completed.

BACKGROUND

The Potter Park Zoo Docent/Volunteer Association is a support organization consisting of active docents and volunteers at Potter Park Zoo. Docents and volunteers donate their time and resources to support educational programming and outreach, special events and the animal care department through enrichment donations/implementation and animal observations. Members pay dues annually to the association and also raise funds through the selling of crafts and other fundraising activities. As funds are raised, the association votes on organizations and conservation projects they would like to support financially. In spring of 2016, the members voted to support the zoo by providing funding for an improved Barred Owl enclosure in the North American area of the zoo near the otter and wolf exhibits. With the changes that occurred in the director position at Potter Park Zoo in early spring, this project was put on hold and we feel we are now able to move forward.

ALTERNATIVES

The Barred Owl is currently housed in a metal corn crib type enclosure near the bird and reptile building. This species could stay in this location and enclosure instead of moving to the proposed new location in the North American area of the zoo.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The \$3,800.00 donation will cover all materials for the project. The labor will be provided by the Ingham County Facilities carpenter and the Potter Park Zoo maintenance team.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) inspectors sited several exhibits during the 2012 inspection as not in keeping with modern zoological practices. The current Barred Owl enclosure consists of a metal corn crib and is not a modern zoological enclosure. It is the last corn crib being utilized at the zoo to exhibit an animal and needs to be phased out as an exhibit enclosure. These types of enclosures are very difficult to see the animal in and do not exhibit the animal in a way that visitors want to observe them. These corn cribs are still utilized to house education animals off exhibit and this corn crib could be moved for the same purpose.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the information presented, I respectfully recommend approval of the attached resolution to accept the \$3,800.00 donation from the Potter Park Zoo Docent/Volunteer Association for the purpose of building an improved Barred Owl enclosure.

RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING ACCEPTANCE OF A \$3,800 MONETARY GIFT FROM THE POTTER PARK ZOO DOCENT ASSOCIATION FOR A NEW BARRED OWL ENCLOSURE

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo Docent Association collects member dues annually and sells crafts to raise funds; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo Docent Association votes at monthly meetings on the organization(s) they would like to donate a portion of those funds to; and

WHEREAS, the Potter Park Zoo Docent Association voted to donate \$3,800 of these funds to the Potter Park Zoo for the specific purpose of building a new Barred Owl enclosure; and

WHEREAS, a new Barred Owl enclosure is needed to improve the housing of the current Barred Owl; and

WHEREAS, the Barred Owl enclosure will be built in the North American section of the Zoo aligning with the current Zoo Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, \$3800 will cover the cost of the exhibit in its entirety based on a quote from the Ingham County Facilities Department; and

WHEREAS, the exhibit will be constructed by the Facilities Department utilizing in-house labor.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Board of Commissioners accepts the donation of \$3,800 from the Potter Park Zoo Docent Association to be used for building a new Barred Owl enclosure at Potter Park Zoo.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Controller/Administrator is authorized to make any necessary budget adjustments consistent with this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Ingham County Board of Commissioners would like to thank the Potter Park Zoo Docent Association for this generous gift.



Interim Director/Curator Report - Cynthia Wagner

I have begun working with Human Resources to complete job descriptions for positions transferring from the Society to the County such as; parking and admissions supervisor, parking and admission seasonal, and encounters (pony, WDU, contact) seasonal.

Andrew Wingeier's last day at Potter Park Zoo was Friday, September 30th, 2016. Teresa Masseau and I have taken on the zoo's financial duties for the County at this time. Delphine Breezy in the County Finance Department will be preparing the Board financial statements.

James Tissue submitted his resignation; he has accepted a position at Lowry Park Zoo in Tampa, FL. His last day of work will be October, 21st, 2016.

With the resignation of James as public safety director we will be looking at that position and discussing whether it should be altered in any way to encompass other duties before we fill the position.

We have been gathering information from other zoos and looking at our admissions numbers to put together data to determine if there would be a benefit in adjusting the daily zoo hours. Based on the survey results it does appear it would be advantageous to try a late night one day a week.

As part of the discussion of zoo hours, it became apparent that the work day for keepers needed to be addressed. In order to create a safer environment for the keepers, animals and visitors as well as provide a better visitor experience and improved animal welfare we are working with Human Resources to change from an 8 hour work day to a 10 hour work day.

Potter Park Zoo's AAZK chapter raised over \$4,500.00 for rhino conservation this year through the Bowling for Rhinos event.

This year we celebrated both World Rhino Day and International Red Panda Day in conjunction with zoos worldwide to raise awareness of the plight of these animals and the conservation efforts in place.

Animal Transactions:

Otters- We are in the process of sending one male to Roger Williams Zoo and sending our male and female pair to Hutchinson Zoo for their new exhibit. We have received a breeding female from Roger Williams Zoo to pair with Miles our remaining male otter. These are all SSP recommended transfers and North American River Otters (NARO) are a green SSP program.

Rhino- Phineus, the male Black rhino at Caldwell Zoo, will be getting his pre-ship physical in late October. It will take several months to get all the test results back; the current plan if all tests are clear is to ship him in late

March. Cleveland Zoo has agreed to loan us a crate for the shipment. This is a breeding transfer recommendation from SSP.

Red Panda – The cubs are doing well, but are still too small to go out in the large exhibit yard. The cubs do have an SSP recommendation to transfer in 2017.

Eagle Owl- The new male Eagle owl is on exhibit and we are waiting for SSP to recommend a female to transfer to Potter Park Zoo.

The animal management committee met and has decided to move forward with acquiring grey and red kangaroo along with emu for the large exhibit the moose were originally housed in. The committee also agreed to proceed with the possibility of acquiring giant anteater for the exhibit closest to the restaurant that currently houses one kangaroo. I will be going to Pottawatomi Zoo with Sarah Pechtel, head keeper, to learn more specific husbandry requirements for anteater before a final decision is made.

Public Safety Department – James Tissue

- Working with HR to recruit and hire staff to fill open positions.
- Now that the season has come to a close, our annual training and refresher training sessions will begin.

Facilities Department - Rick Terrill/Mike Hughes

Facilities have nothing to report other than they are preparing for the fall.

Guest Services Report – Rick Parker

- The camel rides closed after Labor Day.
- The front concession is now closed for the season and soon will be getting a major cleaning.
- The train will remain open on the weekends through October, meanwhile; the pony rides and the bungy jump will be close down for the season on October 9th.
- The new admission prices went well with very few people complaining about the price increase.

Events and Member Services Department – Jennifer Rostar

Public Events

- **Zoo Days** This annual family favorite enjoyed a good turnout with over 6000 guests and a record number of community partners joining us for the two day event. Thank you again to Meijer for sponsoring the event with nearly \$7000 in combined food, cash and in-kind services donated.
- World Rhino Day This conservation awareness event offers behind the scenes tours for guests, kids activities and informational booths and fulfills an important role in PPZ's AZA accreditation. Three rhino exhibit tours were offered and tickets sold out as quickly as they became available.
- **Zoo Brew** July and August concluded the Zoo Brew series for the summer. Revenue totals for the series were \$19,926, which is a more than \$7000 increase over 2015 numbers.

Private Events

• Our private event efforts continue to grow. Year to date revenue produced from private events exceeds \$100,000 with the holiday season still remaining. Some of our larger event hosts include Liquid Web, AF Group, UAW Local 602, Merrill Lynch and various MSU organizations.

Membership

- We continue to see positive progress with zoo memberships. Expenses are on the decline and revenue has grown by nearly \$12,000 as compared to 2015 rates.
 - o Members Night continues to be a wonderful benefit of membership. This year guests participated in behind the scenes tours, animal enrichments, train and pony rides, kids 50 yard dash, special discounts and raffles in the Gift Shop and a hotdog dinner BBQ.

Volunteer Program

• The volunteer program continues to grow with monthly recruitment events and partnerships with many businesses seeking morale building opportunities. Event volunteer have exceeded 1000 hours and garden volunteers have enhanced the zoo grounds with 1275 hours worth of hard work this year! Our most intense season for volunteer needs has yet to come with Boo at the Zoo (1400 hrs.) and Wonderland of Lights (1300 hrs.). Education Department – Dennis Laidler

Update for Summer 2016 Board Report

Overall Education Programming:

After finishing a very busy summer of Zookambi summer camp, along with a large number of public event appearances, the education department is already busy with the 2016-17 school year. The BIG Zoo Lesson (BZL) is already in its third week of classes and we have another record number of classes scheduled. In addition to our standard busy schedule of tours, animal encounters outreaches and overnights, we are about to begin several critical planning initiatives.

Zookambi: Thanks to the hard work of our talented and dedicated staff, we had another very successful Zookambi summer camp. With two new instructors, two new assistants, several new classes and updated versions of our already established ones, there was lots of new experiences for everyone. We are very proud of

the impact of this camp program which continues to provide children with lifelong memories --and lots and lots of fun! We would like to acknowledge all of the support this program receives from numerous zoo staff, from virtually every department at the zoo. We couldn't do this program without that teamwork.

Teen Zookeeper Program: We have another great crop of teen volunteers who spent the summer volunteering in 5 different areas of the zoo --including shadowing with our zookeepers, helping Zookambi instructors, assisting with pony rides, the goat contact area and the seedeater exhibit. This program relies heavily on involvement and cooperation from the animal care staff, and we are very grateful to them for helping to provide this opportunity.

Zoo Science High School Class: Students in the Animal Science and Zoo Management 2016-17class are going to have a great year of academic learning and career preparation. Rebecca Morningstar, our instructor, continues to do an outstanding job of teaching and mentoring her students. Students will be engaged withlearning trips, novel experiences and guest speakers in addition to the core aspects of the class. Becky is continually evaluating and upgrading all aspects of this course and it is reflected in the evaluations and experiences expressed to us by the students. For many of the students, this class was the most impactful thing they have done in high school.

Our zoo is one of a select few of AZA institutions which host a high school course onsite. This is beginning to be an emerging trend as more institutions are beginning to offer these types of programs. I am working with several of my peers from other AZA institutions to put together a session featuring on-site K-12 programs at accredited zoos and aquariums for the 2017 AZA Annual Conference.

BIG Zoo Lesson (BZL): The 2015-16 school year was our busiest ever for BZ --65 classes of area elementary students spent a full week being scientists at the zoo and the 2016-17 school year has already booked another record number of schools with nearly 70 or so squeezed into the calendar! It takes a tremendous amount of effort to be able to pull this off, from virtually every department at the zoo. The education department is so grateful for all of this help --it's why this program is so successful.

All first time BZL teachers must attend a two day workshop designed to get them knowledgeable and comfortable with bringing their class to the zoo for an entire week. We will be conducting this year's teacher training on October 11th and 12th. It is amazing to watch these teachers transform from apprehension to unbridled excitement and anticipation of their week. I would like to acknowledge several key education staff who make all of the BZL logistically possible: Margaret Holtschlag, Director of the BZL; Jill Garnett, BZL Onsite Coordinator; Jeff Wood, BZL Teacher Consultant; Shannon Armbruster, BZL Docent Captain; and Jennifer Horvatin, PPZ Assistant Education Curator.

FALCONERS: (Families of Autistic Learners CONnecting Empathy, Responsibility and Stewardship). We just finished a wonderful overnight event with this program and it was very successful. This program is funded by a grant from the Capital Region Community Foundation and is designed to provide enriching experiences for children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and their families. We are providing a special three-hour set of activities at the zoo one Saturday a month for all of 2016. Each month has a different theme, with numerous interactive stations filled with fun activities. For many FALCONERS families, there is a need to avoid large crowds, so depending on the event, we may open the zoo an hour early for FALCONERS participants. The program has been extremely successful and the autism community has been both supportive and appreciative. We have had families coming from as far as Muskegon to attend! Parents fill out detailed evaluations as they are leaving and the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with many of the parents expressing their heartfelt thanks to us for providing such a program. There have been numerous examples of children with autism making major steps forward –being more engaged in their surroundings, more socially interactive, trying and learning new skills and, most importantly, just having fun together with their families.

Due to the success of this program, we have applied to the Capital Region Community Foundation for additional funding and will know if we have been awarded the grant in Mid-November.

AZA Annual Conference: On behalf of myself and Jennifer Horvatin, I would like to formally thank the Potter Park Zoological Society for making it possible for us to attend the 2016 AZA Annual Conference in mid-September. Jennifer did an outstanding job in presenting in an educational session and also presented a separate poster presentation. I wrapped up my last of a three year commitment on the AZA Conservation Education Committee. While those obligations and commitments were important, it is the information gained, networking contacts made and the laying of groundwork for our upcoming AZA accreditation which made our experience invaluable. We will be highlighting some of those valuable experiences in a presentation to the PPZ Advisory Board and the PPZ Society Board in the near future.

Looking to the Future...

As has been mentioned in prior reports, the education department must move from a model which relies primarily on docents to be the primary provider of educational programming to one where paid staff is the primary education programming providers, with docents still playing a key supplemental role. When it comes to K-12 programming, it is not feasible to expect even our most skilled and dedicated docents to be able to be proficient with multiple themed programs while also being on target for multiple grade level curriculum benchmarks and standards. We have reached a point where we cannot just keep trying to recruit, train, retain and retrain more and more docents to reach our staffing needs. There are some challenges to getting to a new model, with the most significant being funding. Increasing education staff requires additional funding and with the sad state of education funding, there is no way to generate program fees sufficient to cover program costs. Another challenge is our education staff is currently stretched so thin that finding the time to strategically plan for the future becomes problematic.

However, there is some light at the end of the tunnel. The education staff will be meeting over the next few months to create a strategic plan for education programming at Potter Park Zoo. As we move forward, we will be utilizing the expertise of some area educators through the formation of a PPZ education advisory committee. We have had some success in the past with using the expertise and resources from area teachers, administrators and docents to assist the education staff, and we can be even more successful by choosing the right committee members and maximizing their impact. In order to be successful, the strategic planning will also need to involve key zoo staff and board members. It is critical for the strategic plan to be comprehensive and include departmental structure, program development and implementation, and financial sustainability. The plan must also include short term and long term strategies for reaching its goals. This is going to have to be a process, with mechanisms in place to ensure there is no drop off in quantity or quality of current programming during transitions. We are looking forward to this challenge and are excited for the future of education at PPZ.

To keep an adequate number of available docents, we must selectively recruit and train some new docents. We had originally hoped to do this in the fall, but it looks like we will be doing recruitment and training in our more traditional framework this coming winter. .We will also continue working at upgrading the skills of current docents.

The revenue numbers are down for two reasons. The most impactful was that beginning in 2016, birthday parties, and their revenue, now the responsibility of the events department. Also, we had fewer overnights this third quarter compared to last year.

<u>Free Programs:</u> The participant numbers above include many free programs –events at the zoo and numerous public events throughout the community.

*In 2010, we did a couple education programs that had very high attendance, inflating our participant number. In 2011, we started doing educational programming at the Ingham County Fair as well as at home Lansing Lugnuts games, which greatly increased our participant numbers.

POTTER PARK ZOO YEAR TO DATE BUDGET/ACTUAL REPORT FOR EIGHT MONTHS ENDED AUGUST 31, 2016
